Another mining stock swindle has come to light in the state of Washington. This time \$17,000.00 worth of valueless mining stock has been disposed of by promoters of the fake company among the farmers and business men of that state. There are hundreds of good Christian men and women who will throw up their hands in holy horror at the very thought of playing a game of poker at ten cents a corner, but when the smooth, slippery mining stock promoter calls at their houses and gives them a fill about the prospects and the mammoth fortunes that can be made by simply taking a few shares of stock in his particular company, they bite and, like everyone else who thinks he can get something for nothing, are very much disappointed when they find that they have parted with a good many silver dollars with nothing to remember them by but a few neatly printed shares of stock that make them feel ashamed of themselves every time they look at them. The man who goes up against the shell game or the hundred to one shot is no less to be pitied than the one who buys shares in a wildcat mining company.
