Senator Carmack of Tennessee deserves the undying gratitude of the American people for his work in defeating the ship subsidy bill.

Not being able to live on a salary of \$5,000 a year Senator Spooner of Wisconsin has tendered his resignation as United States Senator.

The Bowerman judicial gerrymander has very naturally raised a storm of protest from the tax payers and public spirited citizens who are opposed to the questionable methods employed by the Senator in strengthening his political machine in this district.

Small pox has broken out in the Missouri Legislature, but that isn't half as bad as some of the things that have broken into the Oregon Legislature during the past three years.

It is estimated that during the year ending June 30th, 1906, no less than 4,200 people have been killed in railway accidents in America. While a few of these catastrophes are doubtless unavoidable, the greater portion of them are due to criminal carelessness. In transporting goods, wares and merchandise from one end of the continent to the other the common carriers are not expected to exercise the same degree of care as they would in transporting human beings. In the latter case they are expected to exercise extraordinary care and their failure to do so should invariably mean indictment and punishment for their inexcusable negligence.

In a recent address to the students of the University of Michigan Chas. E. Hughes, the reform Governor of New York, gave expression to sentiments which will hardly meet with the approval of the big chief of Gilliam county. The Governor said in part as follows: "I believe that the people are done with those men who use public office entirely for their own benefit. I was not elected to play at politics, and I am not doing it. I was not elected to build a political machine and I am not building one. I was not elected to set one faction against another and I have not tried to do so."

To E. T. Hollenbeck and S. M. Hollenbeck the above named defendants:

In the name of the State of Oregon:

You are hereby required to appear answer or otherwise plead to the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit in the above entitled Court on or before Friday, the 5th day of April A. D. 1907, and that if you fail to so appear and answer or otherwise plead to said complaint for want thereof, the plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief demanded in his said complaint, which is substantially, First: for judgment and decree against defendants E. T. Hollenbeck and S. M. Hollenbeck, and each of them for the sum of One Thousand Dollars with interest thereon from the 14th day of November 1905, at the rate of ten per cent per annum until paid, and for the sum of One Hundred Dollars Attorney's fees, and for the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars with interest thereon from the 18th day December 1905, at the rate of ten per cent per annum until paid, and for the sum of One Hundred and Fifty Dollars Attorney's fees, and for plaintiff's costs and disbursements herein expended.
