GOING NORTH

The run of trade in Condon is going toward the northern part of Main street and the recent flood in the lower part will help forward the movement. Less than three years ago there was not a mercantile establishment north of Gilliam street and but few north of the old post office corner. Now the post office is at the corner of Main and Gilliam streets and a bank, dry goods and shoe store, jeweler, hardware, clothing, hotel, wet goods, livery and feed stable and practically all the necessities of life are also there. If the town had been built there in the first place it would have been better all around. The streets would be better, floods with their damages and general discomforts could do no harm and in many other ways it would be beneficial. In all probability if Horace Greeley were still alive and in Condon he would say: "Go north, young man."

The latest statement regarding the \$29,000,000 fine against the Standard Oil Company is that if the State of Illinois is sustained in the Appellate Court, it will collect the money by confiscating enough refineries to cover the bill. It is hardly possible that the state will go into the oil refining business, and if it should merely seize the refineries and close them down, it would merely limit the supply of oil and put up the price to the consumer. All these increased profits would go into the pockets of the Standard Oil Company, and the last state would not be much better than the first. Possibly John D. was right and Judge Landis will be dead a long time before that fine is paid.

Party sentiment is nearly effaced in the minds of everybody except the politicians. President Roosevelt, besides carrying out the reforms heretofore promised in the republican conventions, is also carrying out the good ones of the democratic platforms. He is simply doing what many of the former presidents promised and failed to do for the people and that they appreciate this is shown by the fact that not only are the republicans unanimously hoping that he will be re-elected but many democrats, populists, prohibitionists, etc., openly declare their intention of voting for him if he is renominated.
