Condon to Have Better Railway Connection with East and West

The railway commission in a session at Salem on Tuesday ordered that the trains Nos. 7 and 8 of the O. R. & N. shall be in the future operated daily between Pendleton and Portland instead of only to and from Biggs as has been the schedule up to date. The commission has also decided that all trains provide sufficient equipment for all reasonable accommodation of passengers and that all trains stop at all stations between Portland and Pendleton.

The schedule is to be arranged so that all points on the Columbia Southern, Condon and Hepner branches will make connections with the new trains; No. 7 will leave Pendleton, going westward, in the morning and No. 8, going eastward, will leave Portland in the evening. This change in the schedule will enable the people of Condon and vicinity to make connections on the main line as soon as they arrive in Arlington and the heretofore long wait on delayed trains will be done away with. The company will be given 30 days in which to comply with the new ruling.

Another of J. W. Hire's teams ran away Thursday morning. The team, which is driven by Henry Austin, was standing at the depot platform while Mr. Austin was inside. They became frightened at the engine and ran west across the track and into a telephone pole breaking it off about three feet above the ground. The wagon tongue and foot board were broken and the harness torn badly but the horses were not injured any to speak of.
