Bowerman in the last issue of his paper, the Times, devotes considerable space in telling the voters of this district the good things that he had done, and what he has accomplished as their representative in the way of securing much needed legislation, but in his explanation he evidently forgot to mention his connection with the Review Bill, the Deposit law and the banking law, and such other legislation as was asked for by the Title Grab & Bust Company. We imagine this would take more space, and would be more interesting to the readers of his paper than the few minor laws which he credits to himself. We have had occasion to look up the fence law for the passage of which he applauds himself, and find it to be one of the weakest attempts at legislation that was ever introduced into a law making body. No standard is set by which a man can know whether or not he has a lawful fence; and again, there being no standard, it might be decided that a fence was lawful or unlawful as the case might be, and a mile from that particular locality, the fence might be decided just adversely to the former or other decision. The law provides that a "lawful fence shall be such as good husbands generally keep, and as shall on the testimony of skillful men appear to be sufficient", etc. Now there is sure to be a difference of opinion among husbands as to what is and what is not a good fence, and therefore one man might have a one-wire fence which would be pronounced a lawful fence, while a neighbor a mile distant might have a three wire fence and it would be pronounced an unlawful fence.

As we have said there could be no law more inconsistent and unjust than our present fence law. The other other laws mentioned are just as unimportant and as inconsistent and weak as the one mentioned before, and as he has taken this particular act as his first and most important among the measures introduced by him, we have taken the time to look into it thoroughly with the above result. Farmers and ranchers, we beg of you to spend about thirty seconds of your time in reading our fence law, it is instructive, interesting and amusing, and it will not occupy more than thirty seconds of your time to read it. As to his committee appointments we have only to say that his work in those committees together with his influence was not used to the best interests of his constituents, but from the records it appears that his time and energy were devoted almost exclusively in and for the interests of the defunct Ross bank.

All who know Geo. B. Bourhill say he is the soul of honor, and that his word is as good as his bond. Bourhill is the man to send to the State Senate. He will represent the interests of the voters.

The voters of this district can make no mistake in voting for D. R. Parker for District Attorney at the Primaries. The persons who are fighting him have had to resort to all sorts of low and vile methods in an endeavor to down him as they can find nothing against the upright record he has built up for himself. Mr. Parker is a rising young attorney, who wishes to serve the people and fulfill every requirement of that office. Voters will do the right thing to yourself in voting for Parker.

A reader of the Journal asks why voters are required to state the party to which they belong when registering, and why "a voter is compelled to choose only among the voters of his own party." We suppose the inquirer refers to the primaries, at the election he can vote for anybody he chooses; in fact, he can substitute some other name for one on the ticket at the primaries. It was thus that Mayor Lane was nominated. But the object of keeping the parties apart in registration and in the primaries is chiefly, we suppose, to prevent the voters of one party from swarming into the primaries of the other party and nominating the weaker candidates. Hence it is necessary to register as an adherent of some party, so that the primary judges will know whether a voter calls for the right ticket, that of the party to which he belongs. But once in the booth, the voter can substitute any name he pleases. A man registering as a Democrat must at the primary election call for a Democrat ticket, but he does not have to vote it straight. For example, Republicans at the coming primaries can vote to nominate Word for sheriff, and Democrats can vote to nominate Stevens—or any other man—by writing in the name of the man for whom they desire to vote.—Oregon Daily Journal.
