Jay tate Senator from the Eight enth Senatorial District centh Senatorial District by for District Attorney was ex ceedingly close and resulted in the nomination of J. A. Collier by a majority of 12 votes over his opponent D. R. Parker. Mr. Collier carried Wheeler county by 52 votes, Mr. Parker carried Gilliam county by 40 votes while Sherman county gave each candidate the same number. J. C. Sturgill was nominated for coun. y school superintendent by votes and B. T. Snell's majority for county commissioner was 46 J. R. Wells received 307 votes Ior assessor and Joseph Whyte 102. E. V. Littlefield for circuit judge, B. F. Pike and R. N. Portwor for sherift Ches, . Yornor for clerk, Colby Clarke or treasurer and W, A Darling or coroner were nominated without opposition. In the vote or designating a location for he county high school the republicans gave Condon 220, Arling ton 26, Olex 4, Lone Rock 3 and Mayville 2.
