Hatfield leaves Wasco.

Earl Beevis was in Wasco the first of the week on business. He reports the crops in that section looking well and promising an average yield. At a recent meeting of the wheat growers of Wasco and surrounding country preliminary arrangements were made to employ Hatfield, the rain-maker for another year. It is understood that the Californian wants \$2500 for the continuation of his work. A large number of the farmers in the region where the experiments have been conducted appear to be pleased with the results obtained and are anxious to enter into another contract. Hatfield does not pose as a rain-maker but through the application of certain scientific principles under given favorable atmospheric conditions he claims to be able to increase the amount of precipitation. The rain-maker left Wasco this week for other fields. If the information is authoritative Hatfield agrees to give a precipitation of one and a half inches between May 11th and July 1st.
