Built of Newspapers.

One of the most unique crafts ever built in America is that of Capt. George W. Johnson who was formerly a printer on Leslie's Weekly. The boat was constructed with some 3,000 newspapers and served to carry its designer on a 1,200-mile trip from St. Augustine, Florida, to New York harbor, part of the journey being made on a rather heavy sea.

The deck was built up of eighteen thicknesses of paper. In placing the last layer on both the hull and the deck, care was taken to expose the headings of the papers, and as these represent all the countries of Europe, papers from places as widely separated as Egypt and Japan, to say nothing of papers from every state in the Union, from Nome, Alaska, to San Diego, Cal., the little craft has a decidedly cosmopolitan flavor. The boat is 20 feet long, 20 inches beam, 6 inches deep, has 3 inches draft and 3 inches freeboard.

Stained table linen follows the return of the fresh-fruit season "as surely as night follows day." For removing such stains there is nothing more effective than the sulphur bleach. Lay a spoonful of sulphur on a plate, and sprinkle with a few drops of alcohol. Over this place a tin funnel with the point upward. Touch a lighted match to the alcohol; wet the stained linen, and hold the spot over the opening in the point of the funnel. The sulphur fumes will remove the most obstinate stain, seldom requiring more than one application. Rinse and wash the linen at once, to prevent rotting the material.—Woman's Home Companion for September.
