### LONE ROCK TO HAVE NEW WATER SYSTEM.

Two Reservoirs To Be Built—  
Fine Pure Water Will Find Its Way to Every Home.

Lone Rock is to have a new water system and the water that will supply the needs of the thrifty town will be the best in the county. At an election held Monday the citizens of Lone Rock voted unanimously in favor of a \$3,000 bond issue for the installation of the system.

The source of supply is located on the Crenshaw place, south of Lone Rock and consists of two fine springs from which the water will be piped to a hill and stored up into two reservoirs; one of which will be used to supply the needs of the city and the other is to be held as a reserve in case of emergency. From this point which is less than a quarter of a mile away from the town, the water will find its way to the city and will be piped to every home in the city at a very reasonable rate.
