Without the growth of a more pronounced sentiment for prohibition, it will be difficult to obtain convictions for illicit selling of intoxicants in this county. Years ago it was a hard task to obtain conviction against horse thieves. It is different now. The officers, however, will be all the more watchful for any violation of the local option law. There will be no persecutions but prosecutions will be forthcoming. Other laws are obeyed, it will be so of the prohibition law. Local prohibition leaders may have to take a more determined step and assist to a greater extent in obtaining evidence against violators of this law, but it is to be enforced as rigidly as any other on the statute books.

The victims of that dread disease make Waterloos and Cold Harbors appear small in comparative slaughter. This assembly of specialists, noted physicians, and medical experts gathered from various parts of the civilized world marks an epoch in the warfare against this terrible and insidious disease.

The fair promises to be witnessed by the largest crowds that ever gathered in that section of the country. The Elder Robert Fulton.

Robert Fulton was born at Little Britain, Lancaster county, Pa., Nov. 14, 1765. His biographers have called him "a self made man" and have made but brief reference to his parentage. It is noteworthy that his father, the senior Robert Fulton, in a failure to leave financial patrimony to his children has not been accorded the mention of other achievements, not slight in those primitive days. His ancestors crossed from Scotland to Ireland prior to the time of Cromwell. From Kilkenny, Ireland, the Fulton family came to America before the year 1735. The senior Robert Fulton was among the prominent men of Lancaster, his name having been on record upon all the town organizations which existed at that period. He was a founder of the Presbyterian church, the secretary of the Union Fire company and a charter member of the Juliana library of Lancaster, the third library established in the American colonies.—Century.

A number of years ago it came to him suddenly one day that he was white enough to pass anywhere for white, and he acted instantly on the inspiration.
