With an increasing enrollment, will follow higher standard of scholarship. Catholics throughout this section of Eastern Oregon will send their children to be educated here. Others eager to provide a strong liberal education for their children will accompany them to Condon; still others will move to various sections within easy distance from the county seat to engage in farming and stock-raising. The County high school, too, has a future before it. Small as it is this year, it is to grow in efficiency and the quality of its work is to become higher as the years go on. Altogether the prospects for growth for Condon are promising because of its educational advantages.
