NURSERYMAN SAYS THAT LOCUSTS GROW BETTER

Poplars not Particularly Well Adapted to Soil of this Community.

"I am not quite sure that your people do the right thing in planting so many poplars as shade trees, in my judgment, the black locust would prove the shade tree best adapted to this soil," thus spoke R. H. Weber, of the Dalles, state commissioner of horticulture for this district to a Globe reporter, when in Condon last week. "I think that in the eagerness to have fine shade trees in a few years, your people are planting trees which are too old. Young trees, say two years old when transplanted, will give far better results. They will grow quicker and will be more thrifty. I do not say this as a criticism but rather as a suggestion," continued the well known nurseryman.

Mr. Weber is optimistic regarding the future of his home city and said that within ten years he expected to see The Dalles the second city, in size, in the state. "Easterners who have come to The Dalles recently to investigate fruit conditions, are astonished to find how we grow such fine fruit without irrigation. When they visit our orchards they are all the more astonished," added the man from the Cherry City. Mr. Weber owns orchard lands at Hood River and in the Mosier valley. The White Salmon country does not appeal to him as a fruit section because of the expense incident with the clearing of the land, which costs nearly three times as much as in the vicinity of The Dalles, because it is a wooded country. Mr. Weber while in the city was the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Weigel. He had not been in Condon since the coming of the railroad and naturally saw a different town and was favorably impressed with the Wheat City.

CONGRESSMAN ELLIS MAKES FINE ADDRESS

Congressman Ellis' address in the Court House on Wednesday evening was attended by an appreciative audience of both Republicans and Democrats. He was introduced by M. Fitzmaurice. His talk was on the political topics of the day and he first took up the revision of the tariff, advising his hearers that, inasmuch as the tariff needs revising, it would be done much sooner under a Republican administration than a Democratic. He compared the recent so-called panic with the one which occurred in 1857 under a Democratic administration. The remainder of his address was on the present banking system which he declared is the best in the world. This is the first political speech that Mr. Ellis has made in several years.

Scott of Salem, formerly county judge of Marion county was here this week in the interests of the State Good Roads Association by which he has been engaged to conduct a campaign for better roads throughout the state. He has been in several towns and together with others was successful in arousing considerable interest for better highways in those localities. He held a meeting at the court house Tuesday evening at which it was decided to hold a Good Roads Convention in the court house in this city, October 19th. Prominent leaders in the good road movement will be present. Judge Lionel Webster, of Multnomah may be present and ex-Judge Scott who has built miles of good roads in Marion county will address the meeting. Every road supervisor in the county should plan to be present. Ranchers and farmers interested in good highways are planning to attend. Mayville Flat will be represented by its most progressive farmers. The mass convention will be called at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. A program consisting of musical and brief literary numbers will add to the afternoon's enjoyment.

SERIOUS CUTTING AFFRAY

Joe Shaughnessy in Jail on Charge of Murder.

As a result of a cutting fracas which occurred at the Barn saloon in the Dalles, last Thursday evening, Joe Shaughnessy of Condon, has been bound over to await the sitting of the grand jury of Wasco county in November, on a charge of murder in the first degree against Andrew Wilcox.

According to the Telegram correspondent from The Dalles:

"The trouble arose over the possession of a dog belonging to Shaughnessy, who visited the Barn saloon, where Wilcox was bartender, and when he was ready to leave could not find his dog, and claimed Wilcox stole it. He tried to get into the back room where he thought the dog was, Wilcox pushing him back twice. Shaughnessy says Wilcox was too big a man for him to fight, so the third time he tried to get into the room to get the dog, he took a long knife.

Wilcox again attempted to shove him away, and Shaughnessy stabbed him, cutting him across the bowels and inflicting a bad gash, stabbed him in the shoulder and again in the face, when the blade of the knife broke and was not removed until Wilcox was taken to the
