PRaises RICH NATIVE SOIL

Intensive Farming. Hope of Oregon, says Dr. James Withycombe.

RAISE MORE HOGS

Advices Farmers to not Grow Wheat Entirely and to Introduce Rotation of Crops.

Dr. Withycombe in one of his addresses said in part:

"You have a grand country here, a magnificent country with a most productive soil—a soil that never fails even in the driest years. You haven't enough people here, there are enough here today but I mean that your population is much too small. The hope of Oregon is in extensive farming, smaller farms, every inch of ground which will be made to produce and produce abundantly. Introduce a rotation of crops, do not grow wheat entirely. Grow peas, alfalfa raise livestock, fine horses, fat hogs, good cattle. Farming is a science. You may not believe it. You ought to raise more swine here. Do you know that 75 per cent of the hogs slaughtered in Portland are raised in Nebraska?"

To have the distinction of being a live rustler, and the best in two counties, too, belongs to Nathan Knott, of Olex.
