Shall Sherman Win Farm?

The question of the establishment of an experimental farm in Gilliam or Sherman counties has been placed before the people of this district as presented by Pres. Kerr of the Oregon Agricultural College. The farmers of Sherman county are taking great interest in this experimental "dry farming" station, they have held enthusiastic meetings and are united on locating that station in their county. Can the people of Gilliam county afford to let Sherman win out? What will be done? The time for settling this proposition is getting shorter every day and the question must be decided on very soon. A meeting will no doubt be called in a few days to see what action the farmers of Gilliam county are willing to take. It is hoped that the farmers will watch for notices calling for such a meeting and come prepared to offer suggestions.

Poultry raising is one of the phases of husbandry that has not yet been attempted in this section though local conditions are peculiarly adapted to it. At this time there is a scarcity of eggs for the local market. The poultry industry is one of the chief sources of wealth in the nation but experiments conducted at the Oregon state experiment station shows that the poultry business will be found more profitable without the use of incubators.

Does it seem proper that Condon, a city of 1800 inhabitants, should when occasion requires have to go to Mayville, a little city of 100 people to get a band to furnish suitable music for the occasion? If Mayville has enough enterprise to start and maintain a band such as furnished the music on last Friday evening, Condon should be able to organize one which in a year's time would be known and sought for over this part of the state. A good band is a credit to any town not only to the music lovers but also to the merchants. Mayville's band shows what a little energy and "boosting" will do. Condon could and would have a band if it got the same amount of support from the people who live here.

SEN. FULTON SPEAKS

Large Crowd Gathers to Hear Senator Discuss National Issues.

More than 300 people crowded into the Armory last Friday evening to listen to a clear enunciation of Republican principles and the advocacy of the candidacy of Wm. H. Taft for the presidency, as presented by Hon. Chas. W. Fulton, U. S. senator from Oregon.

Party harmony prevailed and leaders prominent in the councils of the party were present from various sections of Gilliam and Wheeler counties. Senator Fulton was introduced by C. A. Danneman, of Clem, an old-time friend of the speaker.

Senator Fulton delivered a strong address explaining some of the planks in the Republican platform and vigorously assailing the fallacies in the Democratic doctrines. He took up the political record of Mr. Bryan and showed how vacillating it had been. His peroration was an eulogy of Mr. Taft, the patriot and statesman. This tribute to the Republican candidate was the signal for prolonged applause from the audience.

The speaker advocated the election of Mr. Taft because it means the continuation of prosperity at home and the increase of the nation's prestige abroad.

Senator Fulton declared that the Republicans favored the establishment of postal savings banks but that the Bryan theory of guarantee of banks deposits would prove destructive to the business interests of the country.

On the question of labor, the senator said that the Republican party had always been the friend of the wage-earner and that through its policies the party had been able to secure for the wage-earner an equality of opportunity and such positive statutory protection as shall place him on a level in dealing with his employer. The Republican party has passed an employer's liability act for inter-state railroads and has established an eight-hour law for government employees on government construction work. The policies of the present administration cannot fail to commend themselves to the approval of the farmers, said the speaker. The Republican party has always been vitally interested in the welfare of the farmers and has guarded him from discriminating railroad rates, has provided for the enforcement of pure food laws and has done much for the promotion of agriculture. It has increased the comforts of country life by the extension of the free rural delivery.
