CONDON MAY GO WET

Medford Liquor Case Also Changes Local Situation.

The Supreme Court, on Tuesday of this week, rendered a decision in what is commonly known as the Medford liquor case, sustaining the decision of the lower court which held that the provision contained in the Medford charter repealed the local option law in so far as the latter is in conflict with provision. The court further recites the provision in the Condon and Estacada charters are almost identically the same as that in the Medford charter and the result is that Condon may be "wet" before long. Three saloons here have already posted notices of application for licenses.
