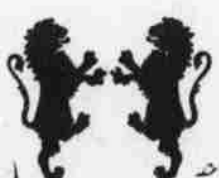

In Heppner on Nov-
ember 17th and 18th.

The eleventh annual convention
of the Oregon Woolgrowers As-
sociation will be held in Heppner
Oregon, Tuesday and Wednesday,
November 17 and 18, 1908. The
O. R. & N. Co. has granted a
special reduced rate of one and
one third regular fare for round
