## REPUBLICANS WIN IN CALIFORNIA, WASHINGTON AND OREGON.

The Entire Republican State Ticket in Washington Elected by Large Majority.

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 4.—Washington joined in the landslide for Taft yesterday. The heavy vote and the slow count makes it impossible to determine accurately the extent of the Republican victory, but this much is certain: Washington gives Taft a plurality of at least 46,000, exceeding by 15,000 the preliminary estimates of State Chairman de Bruler; the entire Republican state ticket is elected by majorities that run well up with the Presidential ticket; the legislature is overwhelmingly Republican, although one Democrat gets in from Stevens county, possibly a Democratic senator from Mason, Kitsap and Island and perhaps one or two more from counties yet to be heard from. There is no doubt whatever that Wesley Jones will be elected to the United States Senate next January to succeed Levi Ankeny.

Following in the state ticket: Governor—S. G. Cosgrove. Lieutenant-Governor—M. E. Fay. Secretary State—Sam P. Nichols. State Treasurer—John G. Lewis. State Auditor—C. W. Clausen. Attorney-General—W. P. Bell. Commissioner of Public Lands—E. W. Ross. Superintendent of Public Instruction—Henry B. Dewey. Insurance Commissioner—John H. Shively.

King county's plurality for Taft is estimated on the basis of the returns now in at 14,000; Spokane county's at 8000; Pierce county's at between 5000 and 6000, and the remainder of the counties, 37 in all, in proportion. The state ticket falls but little below the Taft vote. County tickets generally are Republican. Here and there a few Democrat officials have got in in some of the Eastern Washington counties, but they are exceptions.

It is estimated that at least 155,000 votes were cast in the state. The Democrats made the chief showing on Bryan. The Socialists cast approximately 12,000 votes, as nearly as can be determined with returns which show only about 46 per cent of the vote cast. The Prohibitionists made their usual showing and polled probably about 3500 votes.

In the Northwest, San Juan, with her 850 votes, cast two-thirds of them for the Republican ticket. In land county gave the ticket through just about the same majority. Whatcom gives the ticket an estimated majority of 3900, although in places on her county ticket, notably sheriff, there has been cutting. Skagit gives more than 1000 majority for Taft and the straight Republican ticket. Snohomish is Republican by from 700 to 1200. Jefferson shows a Republican majority of 400 at least. Clallam and Kitsap show a landslide for the ticket, save for the fact that the joint senator was cut heavily in Kitsap county.

### Oregon for Taft by 25,000.

Portland, Or., Nov. 4.—Taft wins Oregon's electoral vote by between 24,000 and 25,000, according to incomplete returns from 33 counties and complete returns from Hood River county. He carries every county by pluralities ranging from 100 in Baker county to 8000 in Multnomah. The state vote stands near 65,000 for Taft and 40,000 for Bryan. In the Presidential election four years ago, Oregon gave Roosevelt a plurality, the vote for being 60,455, and for Socialists, Prohibitionists polled votes in the state as close to 115,000.

To cast on's four votes for Taft the state has chosen the Republican candidates for Presidential electors—R. R. Butler, of Gilliam county; J. D. Lee, of Multnomah; A. J. Marsters, of Douglas, and Frank Miller, of Linn.

Outside Multnomah county, Taft's lead is 16,000, his strongest counties being Marion, 1400 plurality; Lane, 1300; Washington, 1200; Matilla, between 850 and 1000, and Douglas, 1000.

Scenes attending the balloting throughout the city were devoid of real interest. The provisions of the corrupt practice act were generally regarded and the usual buttonholing of electors at the voting places was observed anywhere. Voters very generally discarded campaign buttons and other outward evidences of their party choice before going to the booths.

California Republican. San Francisco, Nov. 4.—There was a state election in California to complicate issues, and the Republican National ticket carried the state about 75,000 majority. In 1904 Roosevelt carried the state by 115,200 over Parker. The solid Republican delegation has been re-elected without change, and a Republican state legislature insures the election of a Republican to succeed Senator Perkins.
