The authorities at Washington have issued some very stringent orders against expectorating in post offices. Paragraph 11 of the rules formulated by the committee to prepare a plan for the prevention of tuberculosis in government offices and work shops, is as follows: "Do not spit on the floor; to do so may spread disease;" shall be prominently posted in rooms, hallways corridors and lavatories in public buildings. Postmasters are instructed to put up the required notices, and if necessary shall call on the local authorities to enforce its provisions.

Oregon and Washington were each given a hearing before President Roosevelt's Commission on Country Life, and expressed themselves as more than pleased with the co-operation they received in these two states. They were particularly fortunate in being enabled to meet the leading horticulturists on account of numerous fruit meetings at this season.
