Docket Finished in Two Days.

PRISONERS SENT TO SALEM

Raymond Case Dismissed—
List of Actions Gone Over.

The light docket for the January term of the circuit court for Gilliam county was rushed through on Monday and Tuesday of this week. The numerous cases pending were mostly either continued or dismissed, judgment being given in only a few. Five criminal cases were soon disposed of as four of the prisoners pleaded guilty when brought before the grand jury.

Terrel Pope, who a month ago stole a purse containing \$55 from a fellow ranchhand on the Martin ranch near Olex, was given a sentence of two years in the penitentiary. A. A. Reed, the forger who had been awaiting trial for several months, was sent on a three years term in the state prison. Reed had forged the name of his employer, making out a check for over \$90 which he cashed at the Arlington bank, but was caught while making his getaway. Reed is said to be a clever forger. Albert Vaughn and David Brown, who had broken into the section house at Quinton over a month ago, were sentenced to one year each in the penitentiary. The four prisoners were taken to Salem Tuesday morning by Sheriff Rogers.

Joe Raymond, a sheepherder, who was placed in jail last Saturday, was released Tuesday. A few days before Raymond purchased a watch from Pauling & Keene and gave them an order on John Madden saying that he had been working for Madden in the Ferry Canyon country, the sum being due him as his wages. Later Madden informed the jeweler that he owed the young man that sum but was holding out a part of it in payment for a dog which he said the fellow had killed. Raymond was imprisoned charged with obtaining money under false pretenses but during that time the dog returned and the case against Raymond was dismissed.

THE ILLS OF MAN.

Appendicitis and Gout Rampant Thousands of Years Ago.

The injuries, disease and peculiarities of the people who lived in the valley of the Nile from prehistoric until early Christian times, a period of over 5,000 years, are shown in a pathological collection on view at the Royal College of Surgeons in London. The collection was obtained during the exploration of fifty-seven cemeteries in the area of the Nile valley lying immediately south of the pillars of Rosetta, which mark the frontier of ancient Egypt.

The survey was carried out under the direction of Captain H. G. Lyons of the Egyptian government. In one grave were found the abdominal organs of a woman so well preserved that it was possible to say that she suffered from appendicitis, which is considered to be the earliest evidence of this disease. Typical lesions of gout were found in an early Christian subject.

A pair of splints, with bandages, were found on the forearms of a young woman's body, both the forearms having been broken just above the wrists. The splints are almost identical with those used at the present day.

Beggars Are Ingenious.

"Nowhere is the ingenuity of the present age more apparent than in the begging letters received by rich men," said a private secretary.
