Two cent postage has gone into effect between Germany and the United States and hundreds of thousands of people in both countries will be benefited by the greater cheapness and facility in communication and the net result will doubtless add largely to that more perfect understanding which makes for friendship and mutual helpfulness between individuals, and peace and comity between nations.

When President Roosevelt started our fleet around the world he had no expectation that the big battleships would carry on an assault with bread instead of cannon balls and make the Italians more thankful than ever for the country that Columbus discovered. The calamity in Southern Italy has given our fleet an opportunity to fight against pestilence, famine and direct suffering.

The open handed sponse of Congress to the President's message asking an appropriation for the relief of the inhabitants of the earthquake area in Italy will doubtless be gratifying to Americans, the givers, as it will be a godsend to

those who receive. The monetary unit of measure in Italy is a lire or nineteen and a fraction cents and the eight hundred thousand dollars appropriated by Congress will mean more than four million of lira to that stricken country and will go far in the relief of distress. Our country is as it should be foremost in this urgent charity. As the wealthiest and most favored land having the greatest abundance of the means of life it is appropriate that we should contribute munificently to any country or people in distress and it should be even a pleasure to help a country to whom we are so much indebted for art, literature, science and civilization.
