The Young Peoples Societies of Christian Endeavor throughout the state are planning to send full delegations to the big state convention to be held in Portland February 15, 16 and 17. Dr. Francis E. Clarke, of Boston, president of the World's Christian Endeavor Union; General Secretary Wm. E. Shaw, and Dr. John Willis Baer, president of Occidental College, are among the prominent names that will be on the program.

Farmer's week at the Oregon Agricultural College will commence Monday, February 14th. The activities will be conducted in institute form and will cover all branches of agriculture, horticulture, dairying and domestic science and art. Anyone who is interested in the practical problems of farming, fruit growing and housekeeping and the new and improved methods which may be used in their solution, will do well to attend the exercises of the Farmer's week.

Oregon ranks seventh among all the states in railroad building during 1909. These figures are compiled by the leading railroad publications of the country and show that the Beaver state added 134 miles to its railroads during the year just closed. The Pacific Northwest is declared to be the great goal of competitive railroad building in the United States. The struggle of the railroads to enter Central Oregon is detailed and development in the Willamette Valley and in the Oregon Coast country is recorded. This is a far better showing for the past year than was made in 1908, when 79 miles of new railway was built in the state.

The winter short courses opened at the Agricultural College Tuesday January 4th, with the largest and most representative body of students ever in attendance. There are men and women ranging in age from sixteen to sixty-five years and representing almost every walk of life. Side by side with the girls and boys from the ninth and tenth grades of the public school of the state are graduates of Brown Yale, Lake Forest and many other great eastern and middle west universities and colleges. There are farmers and fruit growers who own or manage farms ranging from 5 to 2500 acres. There are teachers and housewives, stockmen, dairymen, horticulturists, business men and capitalists. This representative attendance speaks well for the future of agricultural Oregon.

To check the growing cigarette habit among the school boys of Seattle, the board of education has detailed a special officer for the sole purpose of detecting the smokers and prosecuting the dealers caught selling cigarettes

and "de makins" to the youngsters. In many instances where boys have been found backward in their studies, the trouble has been traced to cigarettes. In fact, it is now being urged that a special school be established, where victims of the cigarette habit can obtain instruction and freedom from their enslavement.

Tea is responsible for many ills, especially among women. While it is the simplest matter in the world to make it properly, it is unhealthfully prepared more often than otherwise. Tea is absolutely unfit to drink when the brewing process has proceeded beyond a certain point and tannin is liberated, but if care be taken the evils of moderate tea-drinking may be reduced to a minimum. The old rule which calls for a teaspoonful for each person and one for the pot is unthinkable from the standpoint of the modern dietitian. Such a brew is ruinous to skin, stomach and nervous system.

To make tea properly and as nearly as can be hygienically, buy good tea, preferably black. Heat the receptacle in which the tea is to be made with hot water, use one teaspoonful or less of tea to a pint of boiling water, allow the water to remain in contact with the leaves five minutes then pour off and use at once. Never put the tea-pot directly in contact with intense heat. A very safe and satisfactory way of making tea is by use of the tea-ball, as very little tannin contaminates the beverage thus made. The abuse of tea is common and a fertile source of nervous disease. The habit of giving tea and coffee to young children is little short of criminal.

We are told that "Hood River will soon launch its boom to secure the state normal school." Hood River's energy is misdirected. It should confine its activities to growing fine apples and strawberries, in which it excels.

If a state normal is a "local high school" and a "graft" at Weston, Monmouth or Ashland, what reason is there to suppose that it will become a beneficent and worthy institution at Hood River? Upon what meat hath fed this Columbia river town, that it presumes to say, "I am hoier than thou?"

Oregon is out of the normal school business. It went out in a cowardly and dishonorable way, slandering its schools and forfeiting its obligations to teachers and students by leaving them stranded in the middle of a school year. The state cannot clear its slimy skirts by establishing a new normal at Hood River or any other town, and Hood River's campaign is pure presumption.

Weston has every advantage that Hood River possesses as a normal school location, and once had a flourishing and useful school whose graduates cost no more than those of other states—Cole, Bowerman and the Oregonian to the contrary notwithstanding. Why should the state abandon a \$75,000 plant at Weston and build a new one at Hood River. To dishonesty it would add imbecility.

So long as the state's empty buildings, deserted and gutted, loom vacantly upon Weston's horizon, just so long will it oppose such insolent "booms" as this one launched at Hood River. —Weston Leader.
