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The question as to whether or not the assembly is a joke in Gilliam County is well proven by the fact that at the convention held in this city last Saturday but seven committeemen out of thirteen were present. At the first meeting, called for June 6, it was impossible to get a quorum and therefore it was necessary to postpone the convention until a later date in order to round up every committeeman possible and at the next convention, last Saturday, there were present, seven, just enough for a quorum. Seven committeemen in closed convention to select ten delegates to the state convention to represent the people of Gilliam County, a representation in which the people have nothing whatever to say. Doesn't it sound like a joke? This method of selecting delegates to carry the wishes of the people to the general convention is even worse than the old-time methods. Under the former regime, precinct primaries were held thus giving the people a chance to express their opinions as to the fitness of the candidates at least but under the present system the people were simply ignored. No one, or at least a very few, outside of the committeemen, knew that a convention was to be held. Still the delegates selected are to deliver the votes of the people. It sounds like a joke and a stale one at that.

We haven't the least idea on earth that it would hurt us, and it would as he suggests, help to fill up.
