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It is with pleasure that we call attention to the announcement, which appears on the first page of this issue, wherein D. R. Parker, of this city, declares his candidacy for the Republican nomination and election to the office of Judge of the Eleventh Judicial District which comprises the counties of Gilliam, Wheeler and Sherman. We say it is a pleasure to call attention to his announcement because of the fact that we consider Mr. Parker to be a man suitable in every respect to fill the office to which he aspires.

D. R. Parker was born in Oakland in this state in 1877. After finishing his high school course he attended Drain Normal School graduating also from that institution. He then followed educational work for five years during which time he obtained a State Life Diploma. He then entered the Oregon Law School at Salem from which he graduated with highest honors in the class of 1902. During the year following he held the position of Assistant Attorney General under A. M. Crawford, the present incumbent. In February 1904 he came to this city and opened law offices. During the six years he has followed his profession here, Mr. Parker has made a host of friends in all parts of the district all of whom know of his ability in his profession and are willing to back their judgement of his ability to translate the law in an absolutely impartial manner by voting for him at the coming primary and general elections.

Increased orders for grainbags and excellent threshing returns indicate that the wheat crop of the Pacific Northwest is turning off much better than has been predicted. It now seems reasonably certain that with the large carry-over from the 1909 crop there will be as much wheat available this season as last. The heavy carry-over from last season is having a noticeable effect on the financial situation. Country banks have advanced large sums to speculatively inclined farmers and warehousemen, and this money, which should now be available for harvesting and moving the new crop, is still tied up in old wheat crop. In the larger cities, on which the country banks in the end draw heavily for crop-moving purposes, the drain is also felt, and this year there will probably be a smaller movement of money to the country for speculative purposes.

There will unquestionably be a sufficient amount of money for all legitimate purposes in connection with the actual movement of the crop, but the farmer who desires to gamble on the future will hardly be able to secure such heavy advances on wheat as have been made in the past. Big crops in the country will lose some of their usual significance if they are piled up in the warehouses for speculative purposes. There are still plenty of men in the business who can remember when 50 cents per bushel was regarded as a high price for wheat. These men are not taking any chances on 90-cent and \$1 wheat and the entire trade, both at tidewater and in the interior, will proceed under easy sail until the course of the market is more clearly defined.

With such a heavy demand for

money to be used in all kinds of development work throughout the country, banks will hardly feel disposed to add greatly to the millions that are already tied up in advances on old-crop wheat. An early selling movement will undoubtedly prove more satisfactory to all than a speculative season which might terminate with large quantities of wheat on hand on a falling market. — Weston Leader.

The remark is often made by visitors to our town that it is a prosperous thriving town. Traveling men especially, speak of the amount of business done here. The reasons for these remarks are: That the grain and stock buyers pay the highest prices that the markets afford, often a good deal better prices than are paid in the neighboring towns. To the merchants also is due a share of the credit. They carry large and well selected stocks, bought in large quantities at close figures for cash, and give their customers the advantage of the cut prices. Nothing helps to build up a town more than live, energetic business men.

PROUD OF CROPS

The question is asked by a Chicago newspaper, Why not be proud of the great crops that are being raised this year on the farms? Of course the farmers are proud of their crops, and the tradesmen are proud of them, and the merchants rejoice and the manufacturers are glad. Proud of the great crops? Certainly. It is strange that one should ask such a question.

The crops in this vicinity are especially good this year. They will equal in value the great crop of 1907 which gave Condon the enviable reputation of "The Greatest Primary Grain Shipping Point in the United States," although the average yield per acre will be less.

In all the world there is no country where such great varied and valuable crops are produced as on the American farms and in no section of the United States is there a better chance for the farmer than in Gilliam County. Markets are near every acre of this land. The railroads absorb the surplus and transport it to the market centers of the country or the world. And that which is left behind will not be sold for a cent less than what it could be sold for farther away; or, putting it in another way, nothing will be shipped away for less than it will bring at home. In other words good prices prevail everywhere. The good crop this year means an abundance of distributed new wealth.

Great progress has been made by the business interests of Ore-

gon between March 29 and June 30 than in any two-months period in the history of the state since the establishment of the state bank examiners office. This is disclosed in the report of the Bank Examiner, just made, covering that period.

Deposits in the banks of the state at close of business June 30 totaled \$115,196,986, a gain since March 29 of \$1,192,705. Of these deposits \$11,925,734 were savings deposits, which increased during the same period \$842,985. Total resources of Oregon banks, \$142,418,734. Eight new banks were established in the state during the period covered by the report.

Secretary Ballinger of the Department of the Interior is busy on a trip of inspection of the reclamation project of the state and is becoming familiar with the workings of the service in Oregon. Among other things, he will start preliminary surveys of Crater Lake National Park, looking toward its development along the lines of the better known national parks of the country.
