Co., has not been distributed to men who were largely interested in the colonization of easterners to this country and who would have been glad to send the literature to places where it would have been appreciated and would have brought quick returns. It is about time that politics were eliminated from organizations of this kind in Condon and the citizens can, with a long pull, a strong pull and a pull altogether, accomplish what has been needed for years to build up the Wheat City and surrounding territory, a real "Opportunity Club."

The business manager of the Globe was in receipt this week of a letter from the advertising manager of Dr. Pierce's wonderful discoveries who wanted to sign a contract with us for running their advertising for a period of three years, they to pay the stupendous sum of \$12 per year. SUMMONS.

To B. Tony Smith, one of the above named defendants.
IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON: You are hereby commanded and required to be and appear and answer or otherwise plead to the complaint filed against you in the above court and cause, on or before Friday the 5th day of May, 1911, and if you fail to so appear and answer or otherwise plead to plaintiff's complaint, for want thereof, plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief therein demanded which is in substance as follows:
FIRST—Judgment and decree against the defendants New Madden and E. L. Madden, for the sum of \$200 with interest thereon from the 4th day of April 1908, at the rate of ten per cent per annum until paid, together with the sum of \$75, attorney's fees, together with plaintiff's costs and disbursements in this suit made and expended.
SECOND—For judgment and decree against all the above named defendants foreclosing the lien of plaintiff's mortgage on the lands and premises therein described, and described as follows, to wit:—
The South half of the South-east Quarter, and South-east Quarter of the South-west Quarter of Section Eleven (11), and the North-east Quarter of the North-west Quarter of Section Fourteen (14), all in township three South of Range Twenty-one, East W. M. in Gilliam County, Oregon, and that said lands be sold in the manner prescribed by law and in accordance with the practice of this Court, and that the proceeds of said sale be applied as follows: To the amounts found due the plaintiff, N.
