THE most discreditable feature of the veto of the Arizona Statehood Bill is that it is a violation of faith. President Taft was elected on a platform that promised unconditional statehood to New Mexico and Arizona. This was one of a number of promises made in that platform. There were some persons skeptical enough to suggest that the promises were not made to be kept. These skeptical ones usually had the tariff revision promise in mind, but Mr. Taft in replying to them on the stump unreservedly pledged himself and his party to the strict fulfillment of all platform promises. He did not specifically refer to the statehood plank, but if he thought that should be excepted or that conditions should be attached, it was his duty to plainly say so. As it was his pledge was as sacred a promise that he would use every effort to secure unconditional statehood for New Mexico and Arizona as that he would try to secure a downward revision of the tariff or the faithful fulfillment of all other pledges made.

VIOLATES THE FAITH OF THE PEOPLE

His veto is consequently an act of perfidy and dishonor. Surely plutocracy ought to be satisfied with him. No man can sacrifice more in its interest.

IN Des Moines, Iowa, there has been as elsewhere, considerable complaint about high prices of food stuffs. Some people thought the dealers had entered into a combination to keep prices up. This may or may not have been true, but it happens that Des Moines has a mayor who must know a little more than the average public official. He wasted no time in appointing a commission to investigate the why and wherefore. He did not threaten lawsuits or prosecution under any anti-trust law. If prices are higher than they should be in an open, unrestricted market, he figured, "then there must be some restrictions on trade which should be removed." So he acted accordingly. He removed the restrictions that kept hucksters and others from selling their wares in public places. That did the work. According to press reports prices of food stuffs fell 40 per cent in Des Moines. No combinations were ordered to dissolve. No fines were levied on any one for "engaging in a conspiracy in unreasonable restraint of trade." No lawyers earned any fees. Natural law did the work and that law needs no interpretation by learned judges.

It is a pity that the Mayor of Des Moines is not in a position where he might let some distinguished officials in Washington have the benefit of his council.
