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TO STIMULATE interest in growing corn the Oregon Agricultural College offers ten prizes for the best ears of corn grown by boys and shown at the State Fair. Entries must be made not later than September 22. Gilliam county boys raised some fine corn last year and they should make arrangements to compete for these prizes.

TO REAP a crop you must first sow the seed and cultivate the ground. It is the same in business. Advertising is the seed in this case and the newspaper is the ground which will bring forth most bountiful returns. In sowing the advertising seed see that the ground is in the proper state of cultivation, that is, select the newspaper which has the largest number of readers.

SOME CURIOUS THINGS transpire in the diplomatic world as well as elsewhere. The Huerta administration in Mexico demanded recognition as a government defacto and was disgruntled because Uncle Sam did not respond.
