BRIDGE DEAL PROVES COSTLY

Some months ago H. A. Thiessen, at that time county judge, saw fit to style himself as the "burglar alarm" because he had refused to pay the Globe's bill for services rendered as official paper. At that time he was asked through these columns where the 'burglar alarm' was and why it failed to register when the contract was let for a bridge across the John Day. This question was never answered. It now transpires that there was a good reason why that question was not answered. This bridge deal was one of the greatest fiascos ever pulled off in this county. In January one Eberhard, who called himself the Atlas Construction Co., was given the contract by this county to erect a bridge across the John Day River. This contract was signed by H. A. Thiessen and M. E. Weatherford, a county commissioner still. Eberhard estimated that the cost of the material for this bridge would be \$4400 and he was given a warrant for this amount on a road due bill issued by Roadmaster McCaleb. One half of this has been repaid to Gilliam by Sherman county. Eberhard was to get \$1200 more when the bridge was completed which according to the contract was to have been done by April 1st. Prior to that time Eberhard asked for an extension on his contract and this was granted by Thiessen and this released Eberhard's bonds-

men from any liability in the matter.

The material for the bridge has been shipped to the railroad point nearest to the site but beyond this nothing has been done. All of this material, including freight charges, amounts to \$2304.40 and still Eberhard was given a warrant for \$4400. For material. This little experience has cost Gilliam county \$1000. and Sherman \$1000. although it is said that Sherman can recover this from Gilliam. Eberhard or the Atlas Construction Co. cannot be found. The county has \$2300 worth of material for which Thiessen and Weatherford paid \$4400. They were too busy cutting down honest bills to give any attention to a little item like a bridge across the John Day. Mistakes like this at \$1000 per do not indicate any ability or desire to safeguard the interests of the taxpayers.

PREMIUM LIST FOR SECOND ANNUAL TRI-COUNTY FAIR, CONDON, OCT. 1, 2, 3

TO PATRONS AND EXHIBITORS.

RULES WORTH OBSERVING.

1. If you have entries to make, attend to them at once, and when your stock and articles are offered see to it that they are on time and in place for examination by the committee.

2. Take no rumors in regard to the business of the fair. If you do not know what to do, inquire of those whose duty it is to tell you. One-half of the disappointment and loss at the fair is occasioned by relying on hearsay. Attend to your business yourself. If it is done wrong, you will know where the blame lies.

3. If you are a superintendent or committeeman, report at the secretary's office at 6 o'clock p. m. Transact your business before doing anything else. The public will be better pleased, and the business of the fair will progress with greater satisfaction.

4. Read the rules, and by example, at least, assist in enforcing them; but don't forget that mistakes will occur where thousands of people are congregated. The board will endeavor to do justice to all.

5. Read the programme. If the superintendents and committeemen are not always ready at the hour, keep your stock and articles where you can command them at any time.

THE MANAGEMENT.

The general supervision of the grounds and entire exhibition, police regulations, etc., are vested in the executive committee. No article or animal shall be withdrawn from the fair before the close of the fair, unless by special permit of the executive committee.

The superintendents shall have charge of the several departments. They shall see that all articles on exhibition are carefully removed and perform such other duties as the executive committee shall decide.

ENTRIES.

Entries shall be 10 per cent of first premium in the class in which the entry is made. Children under 16 years of age making entries in the classes reserved for them, shall be free. Entries may be made by mail or otherwise to the secretary, Chas. H. Horner, Condon, Oregon, not later than 2 o'clock P. M. of Tuesday, September 30, 1913.

As it is intended to have the various departments of the Exhibition fully opened to the public at the time specified, exhibitors are notified that exhibits arriving after the dates and hours named will not be allowed to compete. Further information on this point will be found under rules for each department, otherwise 8 A. M. of the opening day will be the closing hour for entries.

Exhibitors will take notice that it is absolutely necessary that entries be made on or before the dates mentioned, in order to afford sufficient time to examine the entries, papers toward the entry tickets and to correspond with parties when necessary, for the correction of errors and omissions, and to prepare the Exhibition Catalogue.

No one will be allowed to see the entries until after awards have been made.

All contents confined to Gilliam, Sherman and Morrow counties. The executive committee reserves the right to give premiums to deserving exhibits outside of this territory where there is no contest for such.

On the entry of each animal or article a card will be furnished to each exhibitor, specifying the class and number of the entry; said card to remain attached to such animal or article during the exhibition, except poultry, which shall be attached to the pens. These cards will not have the exhibitor's name on them, but there will be furnished to exhibitors another card for each entry, which will be the same as the above, and containing the name of the exhibitor, which will be held to identify exhibits with.

No exhibitor will be allowed to place or attach any prize ribbons on articles or animals. Any one doing so will forfeit all claims to premiums.

All exhibition stock shall be required to parade when and where requested by the executive committee.

No article in any of the divisions shall be entered in the name of any one, except the one by whom made or prepared.

Colors denoting awards will be as follows: Blue ribbon, first premium; red ribbon, second premium. Also cards of first

colors for same premiums. The management is not bound to pay cash premiums if none is available.

No prize ribbon can be used to decorate stock.

No interference with the judges during their adjudications will be allowed, and persons doing so will forfeit the right to premiums.

Abbreviations in list: B. R. (blue ribbon); R. R. (red ribbon).

LIVE STOCK DEPARTMENT.

No animal which has not been owned and kept in either of the three counties at least 60 days prior to the time of entry shall be allowed to compete for a premium.

Cattle shown with stallions for sweepstakes premiums are not required to be pure bred, nor necessarily the property of the exhibitor.

In Class 12 each team shall be the property for at least 60 days prior to entry of the party exhibiting.

RULES FOR THE ARENA.

The fair grounds will be open for the reception of all articles three days before the commencement of the fair, and the same will be shipped in care of the secretary. But in no case will such articles be brought into the grounds and placed on exhibition except by and at the expense of the owner or his authorized agent.

Stalls may be secured by parties who have made their entries and have paid their entrance fee within the time prescribed for making entries, and animals shall not be taken by other exhibitors into stalls so reserved in the space set apart for such class.

No animal or article deemed unworthy shall be awarded a premium, but if the animal or article is not worthy a first premium it may be awarded the second premium.

No stock will be permitted to enter the arena unless under the halter, and in care of a groom. Cattle exhibited in pens exempt from this rule.

No grade males of any description of animals, or poultry, will be entitled to any premiums for breeding stock. All poultry entered for sale and not for premiums, shall pay 10 cents for each bird entered.

All draft teams to be shown in harness and hitched to wagon. No sweepstakes allowed where there is no competition.

The entrance fee must in all cases be forwarded with the entry. No entry will be accepted unless this is done, and should be sent by postoffice order, postal note, express order, or in bills in registered letter, and not in postage stamps. All stock entries must be made before 10 P. M. on the first day of the fair on blanks of the Association. These forms are to be filled out and signed by the exhibitor and must be sent to the secretary on or before the date on which entries close.

Every article must be entered under one of the headings in the regular list.

In all cases the right is reserved to reject, or accept conditionally, any entry or application at any time, at the discretion of the Board of Directors. Exhibitors must at all time give the necessary personal attention to whatever they have on exhibition, and at the close must take entire charge of the same.

All caretakers of live stock (except poultry) shall have a session ticket issued to them free on an order from the owner of the stock and approval of the president.

All boxes, wrapping and other packing material of exhibitors must be cleared away by them, and everything be in proper order before opening of exhibition.

MISCELLANEOUS.

No person shall be allowed to sell or give away articles from the fair grounds either during the annual fair or at any time before the commencement of the same without permission of the executive committee.

Stalls and pens for horses and cattle free to amount owned by the society.

The Association will give intending exhibitors the privilege of putting up their own buildings, subject to the supervision of the building committee, exhibitors agreeing to remove said buildings when required by the committee, and acquiring no right or title to the land on which they are built.

Feed for sale on the grounds.

At the close of the exhibition the exhibitors must remove the

exhibits as early as possible. Any article or stand left in the buildings or on the grounds after the close of the exhibition will be at the risk of the owner.

Articles placed on exhibition must not be removed until the close of the exhibition, except by permission of the president of the Association.

Should a transfer or change of ownership of any article, horse, sheep, cattle, pig, or any other article or bird take place while on the grounds for exhibition purposes, the same need not be recognized by the Association.

Exhibitors in the arena must be careful to have the entry cards in a conspicuous place on the animal, that the committee may be facilitated thereby in making awards.

The judges will in no case award a premium where there is no merit, and in case there is but one article or animal exhibited in a division or class, they will award only one premium in a division—the highest or second premium, as may be proper.
