## SHEEPMEN WILL GET PRACTICAL DEMONSTRATION

A demonstration car showing all classes of market wools in all stages from the back of the animal to the back of mankind, will be in Condon on Monday, February 26. A number of sheep showing the different breeds and types for profitable wool production will also be shown. This demonstration will be operated by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the O. A. C. Extension Service and its purpose is to acquaint the wool growers with market demands and the best methods of meeting them. It will show how to improve the wool crop by breeding and management and how to handle the clip to get the maximum profit. The present high prices for wool offer a most opportune time to adapt wool production to market requirements. All the wool growers of this section should be present at this demonstration.

## FEATURES OF THE BONE DRY LAW

Importation of intoxicating liquor for beverage purposes absolutely prohibited.

All prohibitive provisions of previous prohibition law retained.

Alcohol for scientific and mechanical purposes can be purchased only on permit from the District Attorney, and then in quantities not to exceed one quart each month.

Clergymen permitted to import wine for sacramental purposes only on permit from District Attorney.

Drug stores prohibited from selling alcohol for medicinal purposes except on prescription of physician.

Prescriptions must be issued in duplicate and filed with the County Clerk for comparison. The purchaser must make affidavit that it is intended for medicinal use.

Drunkenness is made a misdemeanor by statute.

In fact he supported Barrett's bill which was the same as his own inasmuch as it provided for the creation of new offices.

## COUNTY SCHOOLS SHOW PROGRESS; ESSAY CONTEST IS OPEN TO PUPILS; OTHER NOTES

This office has received notice from the State Department that in the eighth grade examination in May and June of this year pupils will not be allowed to refer to their books in history or civil government. This places us under the plan used two years ago. Teachers having pupils preparing to take either of these examinations will plan accordingly.

The State Department is interested in having all teachers meet the requirements for the professional certificate. The State Superintendent suggests that if school boards were to demand that a teacher have a professional certificate before an application be considered, teachers who have been unsuccessful in their work would be less likely to secure a school. Circulars covering the work have been sent out from this office.

Questions for theory and practice, in the June and December examination for teachers this year will be taken from "The Normal Child and Primary Education" by Gessell.

## TRAINING FOR TEACHERS TO BE STARTED AGAIN

The High School Teacher's Training Course will be taken up again at the Condon Public Schools next Monday. Having completed the observation work, the remainder of the school year will be devoted to practical training in teaching under the direction of County Superintendent Sturgill, Professor Hammack and the teachers of the Public Schools. Superintendent Sturgill has consented to assist in the completion of this course and a part of the teaching will be given in review classes at the High School while much of the training at the Public School will be under his personal supervision. Practically every standard high school in the state has installed or is installing this Teacher's Course and it was at the earnest solicitation of State Superintendent Churchill that the course was installed in the Condon High School this year. Superintendent Churchill, however, stated very specifically that in order to make this course a complete success the united effort and absolute co-operation of parents, pupils, teachers and school boards is necessary.

## SECURES FINE WELLS IN NORTH GILLIAM

Witburn's well drill has completed two more wells for Gilliam county people. One of these was for School District No. 6 where a fine flow of water was secured at the depth of 80 feet. Water from this well will be used for irrigation purposes. The other well was for J. Rice who recently purchased a large tract of land in this county and expects to improve his place. He started right by first having a good well drilled which will add thousands of dollars to the value of Mr. Rice's farm. Both wells have very strong flows of good pure water.
