

MORGAN ROBERTSON.

The Amazing Story of a Literary Genius.

Morgan Robertson was more than a genlus of American literature. He was the psychic mystery of his time. An unlettered sailor, he grinned at the grammarians and wrote "Sinful Peck," marvel of precise English and inimtable style; awed by the subtleties of ng division, he nevertheless smiled it the savants, solved problems in a ew weeks with which they had strugded valuly for years and invented his

improved periscope for submarines. Fourteen years before the key waters of the north Atlantic closed over the steel ripped, dying Titanic Morgan Robertson in his story, "The Wreck of he Titan," written in 1898, prophesied be greatest of ocean disasters with meanny, almost unbellevable faithfulness. When originally offered to a big magazine the story was refused as im-

A few years ago statesmen laughed it the thought of a world war. Ten ears ago Morgan Robertson was writng vivid, dramatic stories of sea batles that parallel with astonishing acuracy the conflicts that are meagerly lescribed to us today:

This great writer had seen the poten int possibilities of death and destrucion in those undersea horrors we know today as submarines.

He prophesied then the great floating forts as represented today by our dreadnaughts, and he painted with master strokes the startling picture of the drend Whitehead torpede on Ha mission of destruction.
