Our national holiday this year will be both a celebration and a solemnity. We are giving men and money toward the prosecution of a great war in order to insure to the people of the world those principles upon which our country was founded and for which the Fourth of July is observed each year in this country—"the right to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness." On this anniversary of the birth of our nation everyone will feel more than ever that in such a cause no sacrifice can be too great.

BUY WAR STAMPS

In the present drive for war savings stamps the government puts it up to us all to make small economies toward a great cause. The Liberty bond issues call upon us to look ahead and balance the difference between income and outgo, and figuring carefully to devote the most we can toward the purchase of bonds. After we have done this, the small savings we can make from time to time can be turned toward thrift and war savings stamps. It has been suggested that the interest on the first issue of Liberty bonds, falling due this month, should be put into war savings stamps. TESTED RECIPES FOR WHEAT CONSERVATION

Steamed Bread.

Onehalf c corn meal, 1/2 c corn flour, 1/2 c oat flour, 1 c sour milk (clabber), 3/4 t salt, 1 t soda, 1-3 cup molasses or Karo, 1/2 c raisins (if desired).

Mix dry ingredients and combine with the rest of the material. Fill a can two-thirds full and steam 1 1/2 hours. Make 1 loaf.

Oat Flour Loaf.

Two cups oat flour, 2 1/4 t baking powder, 3/4 c raisins, 3/4 t salt, 2 T Karo, 1 egg (well beaten), 2 T melted fat, 1 c (more or less) sweet milk.

Mix dry ingredients. Combine with rest of material. Should be medium stiff. Beat thoroughly for about 5 minutes. Put in greased pan, let rise for 15 or 20 minutes, and bake about 45 minutes.

It is impossible to say definitely the amount of liquid to be used with the substitute flours, because of lack of uniformity. Some are coarser than others.

The substitute flours require more baking powder than the others.

Key

t—Teaspoon.
T—Tablespoon.
c—Cup—(a standard measuring cup). All measurements are level. The flour is measured after sifting.
