House on Hwy. 53 a 'total loss'

A house at 89967 U.S. Highway 53 burned to the ground last weekend when a resident accidentally ignited the gasoline in a generator on the deck, according to Chief Bill Boone of Hamlet Fire and Rescue.

The house was a "total loss," he said.

Fire crews from Hamlet responded to an alarm at

10:07 p.m. Feb 21. By the time they arrived, the structure was fully engulfed. "En route, we could see the glow in the sky from over a mile away," Boone said.

Personnel from Seaside Fire Department, Cannon Beach Fire and Rescue, Gearhart Fire Department, Elsie-Vinemaple Rural Fire Protection District, Clatsop County Sheriff's Office and Medix responded as well.

All of the residents got out safely without injuries, Boone said. A couple of pet cats died during the incident, however.

Crews cleared the scene at approximately 2 a.m. Feb. 22, though the sheriff's office remained overnight.

Boone expects the property damage to exceed \$300,000, he said. "It was a big house, but it wasn't in the best shape."

Life Flight to open a helicopter base in Astoria

Life Flight Network will open a base in Astoria and operate 24 hours a day, seven days a week beginning May 15.

The Astoria base is expected to significantly improve access to air medical resources along the Oregon and Washington coast. The helicopter stationed in Astoria will be a twin-engine Agusta 109. The instrument-rated helicopter can make the trip from the coast to Portland in about 25 minutes.

Local hospitals, including Columbia Memorial, Providence Seaside, Ocean Beach and Willapa Harbor, should benefit from having an emergency medical helicopter just moments away.

"Providence Seaside Hospital depends on Life Flight services for our patients suffering from cardiac events and other life-threatening trauma," said Bonnie Thompson, chief operating officer and chief nursing executive for Providence Seaside Hospital.

"Having a Life Flight base here on the North Coast will be a tremendous help whenever we need to transport a patient immediately," she said.

Erik Thorsen, chief executive officer for Columbia Memorial Hospital Memorial Hospital said he was "excited" about the new base.

"Access to a local helicopter will dramatically shorten a patient's transfer time if they need a higher level of care," Thorsen said. "This will greatly improve the care available to our local communities. We look forward to continuing our long-term relationship with Life Flight."

Noting that Life Flight has served the local area for nearly 40 years from the Portland-Vancouver area, Jacob Dalstra, regional director for Life Flight said he was happy to be able to provide a "more local presence."


