# School district's budget committee approves \$21 million for 2015-16

# **School board** will take public comments on budget at June meeting

Seaside School District's Budget Committee finished its works on a proposed budget of approximately \$21 million for the 2015-16 school year.

The committee held its second meeting before the regular Seaside School Board of Directors meeting Tuesday and unanimously approved the budget without changing what was proposed by district staff. The committee will recommend the proposed budget to the School Board at its June 16 meeting, when the board will hold a public hearing and may enact resolutions to adopt the budget, to make the appropriations and to declare the tax levy. The Seaside School District encompasses Cannon Beach.

The proposed \$21,031,919 budget includes increased compensation for all employees by at least 2.25 percent with steps when applicable, according to Justine Hill, the district's business manager.

Funds also have been designated to implement a fulltime kindergarten program at for the general fund, which

Seaside Heights Elementary School and Gearhart Elementary School. The program will be phased in at both schools with a soft transition and staggered start for students.

Two projected offsets will allow the district to increase allocations in school year 2015-16 without making reductions, according to Superintendent Doug Dougherty.

First, the Greater Seaside Urban Renewal District is

set to expire at the end of the 2014-15 fiscal year, which will increase the property tax value calculation and translate into more revenue collections for the school district. The extra funds will be used to cover the district's new full-day kindergarten program. Second, the district's Public Employees Retirement System (PERS) rates will decrease. The reduction, Hill said, will provide about \$300,000 in savings, which will cover salary increases and associated payroll costs.

If the budget allows, the district wants to add a special education teacher and assistant to address the social, emotional and behavioral needs of students, particularly at the elementary level.

A majority of the revenue

is designated for the district's main operating costs, comes from local sources, such as property taxes, and state sources, such as timber revenue. Federal sources are expected to provide only \$7,000. In other news:

• The board unanimously approved a monetary gift from Thomas Briggs, a retired Boeing employee who has been volunteering with Seaside High School's robotics team and at Seaside least \$500 must go to the high school's robotics team.

• The board unanimously approved an interdistrict transfer proposal, which states the district will accept the following number of students from other schools districts for the upcoming school year: one for seventh grade; two for eighth grade; and 20 for ninth through twelfth grade. A letter of interest must be received by Dougherty bu July 31. Preference is given to previously approved transfer students

who regularly attended a Seaside school during the 2014-15 school year or students who regularly attended a Seaside School but have a new residence outside of the district. The transfer, Seaside High School Principal Sheila Roley said, allows the county's principals to support each other and better serve the students by allowing them to go to an out-of-district school for specific reasons. For instance, some districts don't offer certain curricular programs or extracurricular activities that other districts do, and the interdistrict transfer gives students

the opportunity to go where

their needs will best be met,

Roley said.

Local agency boards remain unchanged after election

The Special District Election on May 19 brought little to no change to several agency boards in the Gearhart and Seaside areas, according to final unofficial results from the Clatsop County Elections Office.

Three of seven positions on the board of directors for Seaside School District, or Administrative District No. 10, were up for election. Incumbents Patrick Nofield, of Cannon Beach; Mark Truax, of Seaside; and Steve Phillips, of Seaside, were re-elected to their four-year director positions in uncontested races. Nofield received nearly 99 percent of 1,065 votes with 11 write-ins to nab the Zone 1 Position 1 seat; Truax received nearly 98 percent of 1,034 votes with 21 write-ins for Zone 4 Position 2; and Phillips received about 98.4 percent of 1,032 votes with 17 write-ins for Zone 5 Position 1.

For the Sunset Empire Park & Recreation District Board, incumbents Carol O'Donovan, of Seaside, and Ruth Johnson, of Warrenton, were re-elected for two of the five at-large director positions in uncontested races. O'Donovan received more than 98 percent of 685 votes with 13 write-ins for Position 4. Johnson received more than 98 percent of 672 votes with 11 write-ins for Position 5. The seats carry fouryear terms.
