The Seaside/Gearhart area suffered an embarrassing sixhour power outage during the evening of the 4th of July. Pacific Power later explained that a balloon had caused a transformer to short out and a repair crew had to be dispatched from Portland. Besides the inconvenience to residents and the 40,000 visitors, tens of thousands of dollars in sales were

lost, hundreds of employees lost wages, traffic was snarled for hours and personal safety was jeopardized. Over the last 10 years, Cannon Beach has also suffered numerous power outages as a result of the tenuous electrical infrastructure Pacific Power has installed to service this area.

Pacific Power provides power to Clatsop County from its coal-fired plants in Wyoming. Over 20 jurisdictions in Oregon have opted out of Pacific Power to form their own electric public utilities all of which reduced the cost of power to their customers. In the event of a Cascadia earthquake it is predicted that the Clatsop County area will be without electrical power for three to six months if we don't have a local source of power. Pacific Power is well aware that their service area in Clatsop County is vulnerable to competition since successful public utility districts, such as those in Tillamook and Clatskanie, border it. Pacific Power has responded by putting former Astoria Mayor Willis Van Dusen on one of its advisory committees.

Why not replace Pacific Power with our own public utility district? Cannon Beach residents must hate knowing that they purchase coal-fired
