A Frightened Team Upsets Load of People.

What might have been a very serious accident, happened on Friday afternoon of last week at about 5:45, when F. E. Norton's team became frightened and tipped over wagon which contained five persons besides himself, and left them all but Mr. Norton beneath the wagon box.

F. E. Norton accompanied by his grandson Glenn Hoover, had gone out to Three Rivers to meet the afternoon stage from Sheridan, which had on board his uncles Seldon Norton of Grant's Pass, and Nathan Norton of Independence, Iowa, and their wives, who were coming here to visit their brother J. L. Norton and other relatives.

When the party reached Chas. Jensen's house, a hound belonging to Mr. Jensen came bounding suddenly through the yard gate causing the horses to jump to the side of the road. F. E., whose attention was divided between visiting and driving did not see the dog, and before he could get thorough control of the horses they made another quick jump back into the road, turning the wagon over and leaving the occupants underneath the box. F. E., however, hung on to the lines until he had been hauled from under the box, then he let go. He quickly lifted the box from the rest, and it was soon found that all had been bruised up some, and the little boy who was unfortunate enough to fall underneath two or three of the older ones was found unconscious, but soon revived. Seldon Norton was injured more seriously than any of the rest, remaining unconscious for more than an hour, he having received a bad knock on the chin which cut his lower lip wide open to a point below his chin, necessitating the taking of several stitches.

The injured were at once taken into Mr. Jensen's house and Dr. Smith of Tillamook sent for, he arriving at about 8:30.

It was thought at first that Glenn Hoover's shoulder and right arm were badly hurt, but the doctor said they were only badly sprained, however, the little fellow was not able to move his arm for nearly a week.

The party remained at Mr. Jensen's until eleven o'clock, when they started for their home at woods.

If the beginning of the Norton's visit was not very auspicious it was certainly dramatic enough. However, they can all feel very thankful that it was not worse. We hope the remainder of their visit will be exceedingly pleasant, and that nothing will occur to further mar it.
