VARIOUS SOURCES IN OREGON

There were 41,860 Elks registered at Portland last week attending the convention

The grand lodge of United Workmen met in annual session at Portland Tuesday.

For the first time since Governor West was elected there has been issued an international requisition. It was issued on the Canadian government for the return to Portland of S. P. Denzen, charged with stealing an automobile.

Seaside, which grows prize dahlias, will have a dahlia show August 24 and 25. There is a movement on foot to make Seaside known as the "Dahlia City." It is claimed that nowhere else do the flowers reach such perfection.

Alfred Olson has been awarded damages amounting to \$6000 against the Silverton Lumber Co. for injuries suffered while in the company's employ. He asked for a judgment of \$12,000, but the jury after consideration of the extent of his injuries reduced it to half that sum.

Twenty years in the penitentiary was the sentence imposed by Judge Kelly, of Salem, on A. A. Allison, an ex-convict, who, with W. H. Beeman, was convicted of holding up O. I. Chenoweth. The holdup was accomplished by Mrs. Beeman luring Chenoweth into a dark street where Allison and Beeman covered him with guns. Beeman has asked for a parole and sentence was deferred. Mrs. Beeman is being tried.

Christine Jacobson, of Elsie, was accidentally drowned in the Nehalem river near her home Sunday, while swimming with a party of young people. She was in a skiff with her three brothers and several others when the boat was upset, throwing all into the water. Miss Jacobson sank before help could reach her, the body being finally secured by diving after it, after a search of over half an hour. She was about 24 years of age.

Tillman Reuter, who makes grain grow on the semi-arid lands of central Oregon where none grew before, does not want anyone to overlook the forthcoming International dry farming congress to be held at Lethbridge, Alberta, October 21-26. He is collecting exhibits of the products Oregon grows by dry farming, and, as

usual, expects to win the leading prizes with products of Oregon dry farms. He has got in the habit of winning firsts for this state and expects to repeat his success this year.

According to a dispatch received Saturday from Adjutant-General W. E. Finzer, of the Oregon National Guard, the state troops will not be brought to Tillamook county this year for their yearly encampment and maneuvers, owing to the fact that a joint encampment with regular troops of Idaho and Washington, will be held at Grays Harbor. General Finzer was greatly impressed with this country as a place for encampment when he was here with the Portland business men's excursion this spring, and put the matter of securing grounds in the hands of the Tillamook commercial club. It is hoped that the troops will come to this county next year.

The house public lands committee have reported favorably a bill to authorize the attorney general to settle with the purchasers of more than 800,000 acres of railroad grant land in Oregon at the rate of \$2.50 an acre. The land was granted to be sold to actual settlers at not more than \$2.50 an acre. This stipulation was held by the court to be ignored. To clear title to innocent purchasers the legislation was recommended. The bill as amended validates conveyances to all purchasers of less than a thousand acres at \$2.50 an acre, approves the course of the department of justice in the prosecution of the present suit, and provides that in case of forfeiture lands are to be restored to the public domain subject to entry under the land laws and are not to be included in forest reserves or otherwise withdrawn.
