> According to a dispatch received Saturday from Adjutant-General W. E. Finzer, of the Oregon National Guard, the state troops will not be brought to Tillamook county this year for their yearly encampment and maneuvers, owing to the fact that a joint encampment with regular troops of Idaho and Washington, will be held at Grays Habor. General Finzer was greatly impressed with this country as a place for encampment when he was here with the Portland business men's excursion this spring, and put the matter of securing grounds in the hands of the Tillamook commercial club. It is hoped that the troops will come to this county next year.

The house public lands committee have reported favorably a bill to authorize the attorney general to settle, with the purchasers of more than 800.000 acres of railroad grant land in Oregon at the rate of \$2.50 an acre.
