THE HEALTHFUL SIGN.

The Iron Trade Review says that there is a pronounced scarcity in the steel mills of the Connellsville coke region. There is also a shortage in railroad construction work. Handling the subject of increased output as compared with the present scarcity of city help, the Review editorially says: "Particularly impractical at this time is the suggestion sometimes made that a three-shift day replace a two-shift day. Such a change, to me made at once, is not simply impossible from a business standpoint, it is a physical impossibility unless production be correspondingly curtailed."

The steel industry is by no means the one offering the most inducements to the ordinary laborer. The Pittsburg Survey, the records of the Stanley investigating committee, the testimony offered at steel trust suits and the complaints of the men themselves all show that the steel and iron trade workingman has a hard lot. The indications are that the poorly paid city laborer is steadily being attracted to the country. The Kansas City Journal recently told how, a number of years ago, a party of Germans employed as factory "hands" in Cincinnati, quit their jobs and took up farming in western Kansas. They knew little about the soil and it proved a difficult undertaking. But they made a living—and that was all they made in Cincinnati. So they stuck it out and today those Germans are among the wealthiest farmers in Kansas. The farm is demanding more and more

help and the city man, discouraged at his apparent failure to "get along," is coming to look on the country life as being not so bad after all.
