INTERESTING BITS OF CONDENSED NEWS GATHERED FROM
VARIOUS SOURCES IN OREGON

An election was held at Coquille this week to levy a two per cent tax for city expenses, instead of issuing saloon licenses. The proposed tax carried by a majority of 46.

Mrs. Martha Kiger, of Wedderburn, shot and killed herself last Wednesday evening, it is alleged, after a quarrel with her husband. She went into her bedroom, slammed the door and fired a bullet into her heart.

Warren Reed, a capitalist of West Douglas and founder of Reedport, shot himself last Thursday while hunting and the bullet tore away a part of his hand. The shooting was accidental and the injury, while serious, is not expected to be fatal.

Medford is said to be in line for a splendid addition to its industries in the form of a sawmill to cost approximately \$1,000,000. It is expected the mill will be built at an early date and will employ a great number of men. This will probably be followed by the construction of sawmills in other parts of the Willamette Valley.

During the past week a party of Portland business men have been touring the Coos Bay country, visiting every town in the district.
