INTERESTING BITS OF CONDENSED NEWS GATHERED FROM
VARIOUS SOURCES IN OREGON

Workmen Saturday completed the roof on the new Klamath county court house. It will now be possible for work to be continued on the interior of the building all winter, as soon as the heating apparatus is installed.

Hood River experienced its first heavy frost of the season Saturday night. Up to that time nasturtiums, pansies, dahlias and other fall blooming flowers blossomed perfectly. The frost of Saturday night nipped them. Pools were coated with ice.

The heroism and presence of mind of Miss Janet Estcott, a telephone operator at Marshfield, saved a baby's life Monday, when she grasped a horse, one of a runaway team, by the bits not a moment too soon to keep it from dashing the youngster to death. The second horse of the team plunged into the jagged end of a heavy railing, which pierced the animal's lungs and it fell dead. The mother of the baby, who escaped before her name was made known, seeing the team dashing wildly toward her, suddenly lost her presence of mind and ran, leaving the infant helpless in the path of the runaway team.

James McKinney, of Arlington, was instantly killed last Saturday in an automobile accident. In company with Ed Huxley, his son-in-law, Mr. McKinney, was hunting geese in the fields near Blalock. They shot and crippled a goose that was about to get away and, jumping into the car, they gave chase. The car struck a badger hole and the front axle was broken, the auto turning turtle, crushing Mr. McKinney beneath it. Mr. Huxley was severely bruised. Mr. McKinney was one of the early settlers of Gillam county.

H. Gotthelf, a hide-buyer, was beaten and robbed across the river from Eugene at 9 o'clock in the morning Sunday. He was struck on the head with a large rock and then kicked in the face. A purse containing between \$95 and \$100 was taken. Gotthelf was unconscious for a few minutes from the blows and kicks and was found in that condition by a farmer who helped him to town. Gotthelf met the two men in the Eugene Coffee Club. They represented that they were farmers, and told him they had hides to sell. They made an appointment with him to meet across the river, and when the hide-buyer arrived at the appointed place, the men pounced upon him, assaulted and robbed him.
