World peace is being all shot to pieces is Germany, Belgium, France, Turkey, Servia, South Africa, Mexico, China, Austria-Hungaria and several other countries too numerous to mention.

If this world could be purged of racial hatred and religious prejudice, there would be fewer wars, more truth, less suspicion, an absence of conspiracy, and a fellowship of man that would be worth bragging about.

## THE MEXICAN MUDDLE.

It is almost beyond the comprehension of man to determine what those fellows in Mexico are driving at. The long and bloody period of unrest and discontent, so promising of peace a few weeks ago, looks now doomed to a continuance of the sanguinary conflict.

Villa, Carranza and the whole bunch of leaders are again on the outs and the war is to be continued. Villa has ordered an attack to be made upon the port of Tampico, which means a renewal of the trouble. Tampico is an important port on the gulf of Mexico and affords a means of reaching the interior of Mexico.

The Mexican character is so subject to change that it is impossible to tell where the next break will come.

If the United States should intervene in that country, it would no more than have settled the trouble and withdrawn its troops, than the whole work would have to be done over again.

As long as Villa remains the idol of the rebellious forces, Mexico need not expect a cessation of hostilities. He is liable to break

out in rebellion at any time and in any place. He pays no heed to the findings of the Aguascalientes convention, and the provisional president selected by that conference refuses to obey its commands.

The Mexican muddle remains as clear as mud.

## FARMERS, BE ON GUARD.

Farmers of Tillamook county should be on their guard against the foot and mouth disease which is ravaging the cattle of many states. There is no case of the disease here yet. There may be none, but it is always the safe plan to take advantage of warnings. Forewarned is forearmed.

In case of a suspected case, the animal should be quickly isolated and the state officials notified.

It behooves every Oregon farmer to look well to the problem of prevention of the ravages of this plague. The following rules for preventing contagion are authoritatively announced:

Segregate cattle from infected herds.

Keep cattle, sheep, hogs and horses from ranging on land or highways traversed by infected cattle.

Spray creosote and bichloride of lime on infected areas.

Slay infected animals and bury them in quick lime.

Do not allow persons from farms where disease exists to visit your farm. The germs may be carried twenty miles on the sole of the shoe.

Kill all rats in infected areas.

Quarantine all cattle which have come in contact with infected cattle and bind hoofs with bandages soaked in bichloride of lime. The disease will run through a whole herd.

The foot and mouth disease is said to have been known for centuries and had its original seat in Western Asia and Eastern Europe where it has been ever prevalent. Its first appearance in this country

was in 1870 coming by way of Canada through the importation of infected cattle. At that time it was found in certain parts of New York state and in some of the New England states and was not very serious. There was a small outbreak of the disease in Maine in 1884 and a far more serious outbreak in 1902.

The epidemic primarily affects cattle sheep and swine, but the other farm animals are not entirely exempt, while it has also been known to affect man. The disease manifests itself by the appearance of blisters within the mouth and upon the feet.

The symptoms in cattle appear in two or three days and sometimes even in a single day, after the exposure to the disease, the animal showing signs of sickness, lack of desire to feed, general uneasiness and the running of saliva from the mouth.
