THE RECALL.

It is not a pleasant thing to recall or be recalled, in the light of the present meaning, and in a generally accepted meaning, that of placing the power in the hands of the voter, is a commendable law, but to abuse this privilege makes the law so completely unbearable that the disgust it generates is so far reaching that no good is possible to result. When the grand jury was called to investigate the actions of the district attorney what was it for? Certainly it could not have been for the purpose of putting in circulation a recall petition and had they found cause sufficient to warrant them in circulating such a petition would not that cause been sufficient to have tried him on?

However, the situation is as it is, and we are to have an election at the expense of the tax payers to the tune of ten or twelve hundred dollars. Mr. Gersoni complains that he has been condemned without a chance of being heard, and it seems that his complaint is well founded. Even those who have urged him the strongest to resign do not admit that they gave him a chance to be heard. It is the right of every citizen to be heard in his own defense and this seems to have been a privilege of which the attorney has been deprived, and as is generally the rule there are those who sympathize with the under dog. It has made a strong following for the one whose recall is asked of the voters of the county.

Three candidates are now in the field, Attorneys Goyme, Callahan and Farnell. We have met these attorneys and so far as we know either of them would prove capable, the two latter are young men and from the way they are making the

canvas do not lack ambition.

However, if there is to be a change made in this office, it should be the result of careful thinking on the part of the voter before the vote is cast. It would be hazardous to recall the present incumbent and elect another in office whose work would not be satisfactory. It is an important office and should be filled with one perfectly competent, willing to carefully guard the county's interest and one whom we know is sufficiently versed in law to command the respect and attention of the court as well as the people.

Of course it is considered that the voters will not take the candidacy of either Attorney Callahan or Attorney Farnell seriously. They have only been in the county a short time and this recall election affords them a splendid opportunity to advertise and get their names before the people.

The office of District Attorney is too important to be handled by any one but a time-tried attorney, one of the older heads of the county, and as the best is none too good for Tillamook county, every voter should carefully consider the candidates before casting his vote and then vote for a man who will be a credit to the office.
