The Courier is again called upon to chronicle the death of an old and respected pioneer. It will be remembered that two weeks ago Mrs. Jensen, while engaged at her household washing accidentally scalded herself with a boiler of water. Dr. Shearer was once called and did all that medical skill could do. The feeble life seemed to tremble in the balance for several days, her family and friends hoping against hope. She succumbed to the shock on Tuesday morning. The funeral took place from the home, Rev. F. S. Ford, pastor of the Presbyterian church, officiating. Friends from all over the south part of the county were present and filled the house, scores had to remain outside. The service was simple and brief. Many contributions of beautiful floral emblems were placed on her grave in the Old Fellow's cemetery by her neighbors and friends of years of acquaintance. A long procession of friends followed the remains to their last resting place.

OBITUARY.

Marew Sophia Hansen was born in Denmark May 26, 1842; in November, 1866, she was joined in marriage to Mr. Lars Jensen, and to this union six children were born, two of whom died in infancy. Mrs. Jensen was a member of the Lutheran church, also a member of the Grange, where she was faithful in the discharge of her duties as an officer of the lodge. For a short time she lived in New Jersey, moving to California and 35 years ago moved to Hebo, Oregon, where she died at the age of 73 years, one month and nine days. She is survived by her husband, two sons and two daughters. She was a woman much respected at this end of the county where she was so well known.
