Needed Road Improvement.

Jerome Dunn was in town Wednesday evening, following a short visit at the county seat. Mr. Dunn is very much interested in the good roads movement and like a great many others in this end of the county, he wants to see work commence early in the spring on the Little Nestucca road. So do we. Here is where our cut-off over the tide land would become doubly useful. In order to make a desirable complete road that will benefit the Oretown-Neskowin people and every other property owner in that section the road should be layed out on the most practical route from Oretown to the Sour Grass junction, touching the cut-off road leading to Cloverdale at the most practical point. This will give those coming from the valley to the resorts here an opportunity to visit Neskowin and Pacific City or either one of them without driving all over christendom to get there. This road also provides a way for ranchers to get grain from the Willamette Valley at much less expense than by the means now used. Today about all outside travel is over the Three Rivers road and of necessity compels them to come through Cloverdale to reach either of these resorts or the ranches in the south end of the county. This to quite an extent is a benefit to the business interests of Cloverdale, but notwithstanding this fact the Courier believes it best to have roads layed out where they should be and will support such improvements regardless of the personal interests of a few or many.
