INTERESTING BITS OF CONDENSED NEWS GATHERED FROM
VARIOUS SOURCES IN OREGON

Three warehouses were burned at Yoncalla Saturday with a total loss of \$10,000. The fire started at noon and swept from one building to another. Agricultural implements, dried prunes and hay were among the principal property destroyed. There was some insurance on the buildings, but none on the contents and these were a total loss.

Threatening letters have been received by the T. A. Livesly Hop company of Quinaby and a night watchman has been appointed at the Lakebrook farm in Mission Bottom, where the company's hop-picking machine is installed. The heavy fire loss at the company's yards south of Salem recently has caused the owners to take precautions at the yards at Quinaby.

Within the next few weeks the supreme court will rule on the constitu-

tionality of the 1913 loan shark law briefs having been filed with the clerk of the court in a case in which the act is assailed. The validity of the law is attacked in the case of the state vs. E. E. Ware, convicted in Portland of making loans at a rate of interest greater than 10 per cent per annum without having obtained a license from the state banking board. Ware's attorneys contend that the law is class legislation, and that it is unconstitutional on the grounds that it grants special privileges.

Senator Chamberlain has notified the father of Louis Husser, the Dallas boy who has been held a prisoner of war at Kingston, Ont., for nearly a year, that the Canadian government has finally refused the request of the state department for the release of the man.
