**Visits Sour Grass Road.**

Through the kindness of L. M. Kraner the editor on last Sunday had an opportunity of viewing the Sour Grass road project. Mr. and Mrs. Kraner, Arba Staverson and the editor and his wife left early Sunday afternoon in Mr. Kraner's auto and after a pleasant ride of several miles on the Three Rivers road the Tillamook county end of the Sour Grass road was reached. Mr. Kraner and the writer then left the machine and struck out on the new road through the mountains. For a distance of a mile or so the walking was not bad, but this good walking did not last as we wished, for the farther we went the harder was the traveling until the road had narrowed down to only a trail. After climbing over and under logs for about two miles, which seemed a great many more, the improvement on the Yamhill end was reached and there we discovered the machine in waiting for us, Arba and the ladies having made the trip around the old road and as far back on the new road as was possible to run an auto.

When the Sour Grass road is completed it will be one of the best improvements the county has ever made. The grade will be practically a level one

and with the improvement of the Little Nestucca road which intersects this road near the Tillamook end it will make a hillless road from Tillamook, anywhere, to the outside.

To see this new piece of road as Mr. Kraner and the writer did last Sunday is to realize what a herculean task it is to make a road through the wilds as this road is being made. We had an opportunity of talking with the builders of the road and learned that they were just putting on a night force and would work two shifts. They have a steam shovel at the Yamhill side of the project and clearing right of way and grading follow close upon each other.

After climbing some bad hills on the Dolph road, some of them so bad that had not Mr. Kraner and the editor been professional boosters, the machine and its occupants would have remained on the other side of the hill, the party reached home early in the evening, tired but more than pleased with the fact that they had seen what it meant
