Ascension Island.

The island of Ascension, in the Atlantic, belonging to Great Britain, is one of the most unique places in the world, in that there is no private property in land, no rents, no taxes and no use for money. The flocks and herds are public property, and the meat is issued as rations. So are the vegetables grown on the farms. When an island fisherman makes a catch he brings it to the guardroom, where it is issued by the sergeant major. Practically the entire population are sailors, and they work at most of the common trades. The climate is almost perfect, and anything can be grown. The island is 8 miles by 6 in size and has a population of about 450. It is 276 miles northward of St. Helena and is governed by a captain appointed by the British navy.

Our Elastic Arteries.

Our arteries are constructed to withstand enormous pressure from the blood that courses through them, and they naturally possess very great elasticity.
