## MILK AS A BOOZE SUBSTITUTE.

The cow is coming to her own. Her praises are being sounded all over the world. The cause of this is the war in Europe and the spread of prohibition in the United States.

France is finding milk an excellent substitute for absinthe which she discarded when hostilities started.

The pasteur institute of Paris has just made the declaration that milk is one of the most powerful stimulants known. It has been used liberally to stimulate the French soldiers before they go into battle and with such good results that the French government now urges the sale of milk in preference to other soft drinks behind the trenches when the men are off duty.

And now comes our own state of Oregon, through the state dairy association, offering a "hot milk highball" to take the place of applejack handed over the bar in the balmy days of booze and bug houses.

The state dairy convention recently held in Corvallis requests the publication of the following resolution unanimously adopted by them:

Whereas, it has been well proven that hot milk is a better stimulant in case of chill or exhaustion than whiskey, and that either hot or cold milk, alone or in combination with various flavors or spices, can be made into drinks that are extremely palatable and nutritious, and  
Whereas, the passing of the saloon in the three northwestern states creates a great opportunity for the larger use of milk, by having it kept in the soft drink houses, therefore be it

Resolved, that the president is authorized and instructed to appoint a committee to act either directly or in conjunction with the lately organized dairy council, whose duty it shall be to prepare literature and have it distributed, setting forth the value of hot

milk as a stimulant, and of other milk drinks as a beverage, and giving recipes and suggestions for their use; and each member of this association is urged to personally try to induce soft drink houses, coffee houses, etc., to keep hot milk and other milk drinks constantly on hand.

The cow is surely coming to her own when her lacteal fluid is to be made into the most palatable stimulating beverage and cheese as a food, one pound equaling three and a half pounds of lean beef, could not be otherwise.

If it hadn't been for the fact that last year we everlastingly boosted loganberry juice as a beverage we would suggest that each of our readers get a cow and eat, drink and be merry.

## Radium Too Dear For Soil.

Professors Hopkins and Sachs of the University of Illinois have been testing the effects of radium on the soil and find that any quantity that can do any possible good to the crops will cost so much as to make its use prohibitive. One milligram of radium costs \$100. This distributed over an acre of ground did no appreciable good. Merely to double the quantity of radium emanation normally in the earth would, as the Scientific American points out, cost the farmer \$7,500 an acre!
