JOINS THE PENSION LIST.

The Wells Fargo Express company is one of the latest corporations to adopt a system of pensions for employees. The corporation has for some years made provision for certain superannuated employees, and has dealt liberally with its men, but it was not until the first of this present month that it adopted an advanced scheme of taking care of all of its employees.

According to the new system, there is a regular schedule of pay for injured men, and for the continuance of pay to the dependents of any employee who is killed or who dies, the rate being based upon the number of years' service with the company. The usual details regarding retirement after a certain number of years is provided.

It is coming to be a well-established principle of American industry that employers must make provision for the retirement of old employees and taking care of those who are injured or incapacitated. Turning a man adrift after years of faithful service, or failing to provide for him if he is injured in the service of the corporation, is no longer tolerated, in a sense. Any employer who follows that course—and it used to be followed by all employers—finds himself handicapped in a hundred ways. Certainly he does not enjoy the standing in the business world that does a company or corporation or employer who makes provisions for retirement after a certain period.
