Richards, formerly of Provo, Utah, but for the past few years living on a ranch with his wife and son near Hudson's corners, died Tuesday afternoon of paralysis, from which he had been a sufferer for a number of years. State Sealer of Weights and Measures is Here.

J. F. Jones, district sealer of weights and measures, is in the Nestucca Valley today. To the Courier last evening he stated that he had found several scales in the county that were not up to the requirements. He said that no fault could be found with the owners of the scales generally, and that they were all willing to have them corrected, especially was this true with the scales found in merchandise establishments.

Eight scales in use in the creamery and cheese factories were condemned for repairs, and 55 weights were found to be light from $\frac{1}{8}$ to $\frac{1}{4}$ ounces, most of these being counter-poise weights where the error multiplies one or two hundred times. Practically all of these weights were adjusted so as to conform with standard. Such as could not be made standard were condemned permanently.

One scale was discovered in use, the weights of which had been drilled out so that the scales would at all times weigh light when used with such weights. In one instance weights were being used upon a scale different from the one for which they were made, with the result that articles weighed were light. Eighteen scales were permanently condemned, 25 were adjusted and corrected, and a total of 125 scales were sealed as corrected.

Auto Roll Over Grade.

A large auto with seven passengers run off the grade at Fletcher's beach last Saturday and rolled down a 60-foot embankment. The party in the auto were tourists from Salem. The auto rolled over several times before reaching the bottom of the grade. No one was injured more than a few bruises and a shaking up.
