A New Thing in Silos.

A party consisting of L. M. Kraner and wife, D. T. While visiting the fair our attention was directed to a new thing in silo building. It is a patent owned by W. H. Monroe and as the people of Tillamook county are becoming more and more convinced that the silo is almost a necessity on the farm we took the pains to thoroughly investagate this new silo.

The sile is made entirely of Oregon fir wood tongued and grooved, and laid horizontally, the ends being interlocked or dove-tailed in such a manner that makes warping next to impossible. When dry the weighs of the material keeps the silo air tight, and when wet the natural expansion meets no resistance whatever, so that wet or dry it is

This sile is put up without nails or bands and in consequence is a much cheaper constructed and in appearance looks as well if not better than the old style silo.
